## Pathways for Pardon and Rights Restoration in Georgia

### 1. Georgia Pardon Process

A pardon in Georgia is an act of executive clemency that grants forgiveness for a conviction, often aiding in employment or education opportunities. It does not expunge the record but is noted on your criminal history as evidence of rehabilitation.

#### Eligibility Criteria for a Georgia Pardon:

- Completion of all sentences (including probation and fines) at least 5 years prior (10 years for sex offenses requiring registry).
- Law-abiding life during the waiting period.
- No pending charges; all fines paid.
- For sex offenders: Psychosexual evaluation, polygraph, and SORRB risk level within 90 days.

#### Application Process:

- Submit electronically via the Board's portal (effective 2024).
- Include recent criminal history, court dispositions, and personal statement.
- Face-to-face interview required.
- For sex offenders: Upload evaluations and polygraph results.

Timelines and Differences: Processing takes approximately 6-9 months, though this is a general time statement. A pardon differs from restorations by offering official forgiveness for qualifying convictions. Georgia cannot pardon for out-of-state convictions.

## 2. Restoration of Civil and Political Rights in Georgia

Restoration of civil and political rights reinstates privileges lost due to a conviction, such as serving on a jury, holding public office, or becoming a notary public. Voting rights are automatically restored upon sentence completion, requiring no application. *Please note: a restoration of civil and political rights can restore firearm rights for out-of-state prohibiting convictions, but it does not restore firearm rights for Georgia prohibiting convictions.*

Eligibility Criteria:

- Completion of sentences at least 2 years prior.
- Law-abiding life since completion.
- Residency in Georgia; no pending charges.

Application Process:

- Electronic submission with criminal history and dispositions.
- No interview required.
- Address unresolved cases, such as Dead Dockets.

Timelines and Differences: Processing takes 6-9 months. Unlike pardons, this focuses solely on civil participation rights and does not include firearm rights.

## 3. Restoration of Firearm Rights in Georgia

Restoration of firearm rights allows individuals to receive, possess, or transport firearms post-conviction, supporting Second Amendment privileges. It does not apply to federal convictions or dishonorable military discharges.

Eligibility Criteria:

- Completion of sentences at least 5 years prior (10 years for sex offenders).
- No "criminal involvement" in the previous five years.
- Law-abiding life; no pending charges.
- Not available for certain federal or military disqualifiers.

Application Process:

- Check specific option on the application form.
- Include three notarized reference letters from non-family members.
- Mandatory face-to-face interview.
- Issued alongside a pardon for Georgia convictions or civil rights restoration for out-of-state convictions.

Timelines and Differences: Processing takes 6-9 months. It requires additional documentation and an interview compared to civil rights restoration and is distinct from automatic voting rights restoration.
